What We Do

Turning Points Collaborative Society addresses the urgent needs of people experiencing, or at risk of, homelessness in the Okanagan. We provide a continuum of care through outreach, shelter, housing solutions, employment programs, and addictions recovery. Guided by deep respect for the dignity and expertise of those we serve, we meet people where they are at, and work to create pathways to stability, health, and belonging.

OUTREACH

Turning Points' Outreach programs are often the first point of connection for people facing homelessness, housing instability, or urgent health and income needs. Our outreach solutions seek to prevent homelessness, relieving pressure on emergency services and shelters.

In Vernon, Kelowna, and West Kelowna, our teams meet people where they are - providing immediate support, reconnecting individuals to home supports, securing access to benefits and rent supplements, and connecting to resources such as mental health and addiction services, and housing options.

Rapidly diverts individuals from homelessness by helping to stabilize vulnerable individuals and link clients to services and supports. This coordinated approach contributes to a compassionate response.

Housing Outreach & Loss Prevention - 277 clients

Temporary rent supplements help people remain housed during sudden income loss, unexpected expenses, or other crises – promoting long-term well-being and community stability.

Access to Benefits - 62 clients launched October 2024

Helps clients navigate and access essential government and financial resources i.e. securing ID, accessing income assistance, CPP, OAS, GIS, disability benefits, and filing taxes.

West Kelowna Outreach - 2180 meals served

Serves individuals with no other local options for meals or support.

Scattered Sites & Winter Response - 57 clients

This is a transitional housing program which provides short-term hotel rooms for individuals facing homelessness who are not suited to traditional shelters. Of the 57 people supported - 48 moved into market housing.

Cammy LaFleur Street Clinic - 7900 client interactions

Offers harm reduction, health care, testing, and a welcoming, inclusive space.

Successful diversions of individuals seeking shelter - to stable housing or home supports through the Shelter Hub.

SHELTER SERVICES

Turning Points operates shelter services across Vernon, Kelowna, and West Kelowna, offering safe, temporary housing and wraparound supports for individuals experiencing homelessness. Staff aim to provide health care access, harm reduction services, housing navigation, life skills support, and community connections.

Our shelters focus on immediate safety while creating clear pathways toward stability, recovery, and permanent housing.

Vernon Shelter - 60 spaces

Served 360 clients this year, offering on-site health care, WorkBC services, housing outreach, and regular community-building activities. Helped clients transition into treatment, supportive housing, market rentals, and long-term care, despite turning away individuals 1,892 times due to capacity.

Bartley Court Shelter West Kelowna - 38 spaces

Supported 286 unique clients this year. Provides clinical health care, harm reduction services, and strong community engagement through clean-ups and education initiatives. Bartley Court piloted a Holistic Harm Reduction (HHR) approach which saw dramatic improvement in client stabilization, leading to permanent housing for 49 individuals.

Richter Shelter Kelowna - 48 spaces

Served 407 clients, with 57 successful housing transitions. Introduced HHR approach, expanded health partnerships, and created a Client Support Worker role to help individuals transition from outdoor sheltering to indoor stability. Renovations improved accessibility, safety, and client wellness. Significant reduction in critical incidents and overdoses since fall 2024.

Our Place Vernon - 26 spaces

Served approximately 100 clients this year, connecting them to treatment, supportive and affordable housing, market rentals, and long-term care. Regular visits from addictions services and housing outreach strengthen connections to community supports.

People transitioned from shelter into stable, permanent housing.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

Trailside - Kelowna (59 units)

Opened in May 2024, Trailside served 96 clients in less than a year, helping at least 20 of those move into market housing, affordable housing, assisted living, or reunite with family. The program prioritizes seniors and individuals with disabilities, offering intensive supports to reduce time spent homeless.

Services include health-focused case management, life skills training, daily living support from licensed care staff, and strong community integration through regular outings, peer work opportunities, and community clean-ups.

Alfred is making the most of the wraparound supports available to him here. After decades of precarious housing, he has stabilized his health and well-being at Trailside and even found joy in being able to paint again.

TPCS' affordable housing provides permanent, safe, and low-cost homes for hundreds of residents, many of whom are seniors, families, or individuals in long-term recovery. Demand remains extremely high, with up to 200 people on waiting lists in some areas. Sites also offer eviction prevention strategies, life skills programs, and community-building activities like BBQs, gardening, information sessions, and cultural celebrations. Affordable housing ensures people who might otherwise face homelessness have a stable home for as long as they need it.

SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

Supportive housing combines permanent accommodation with on-site support to help residents maintain stability.

By offering structured group programming, community meals, access to internal and community services, and life skills development, residents at all sites are building healthier routines, reducing isolation, and working toward personal goals.

Waitlists remain long with 200 applicants in Vernon alone. A new 52 unit supportive housing complex called The Willows broke ground in Vernon in January of 2025, with completion expected by December.

Story of Success

When Jody (pseudonym), a single parent with a new baby, came to us she was without stable housing and new in her recovery. Despite many barriers, she showed fierce advocacy for herself and clear determination to build a healthy future for her and her child.

Through our outreach team and community partners, she was welcomed into a freshly renovated unit at **The Village - our affordable family housing** site in Kelowna. On move-in day, our team filled the home with essentials,

furniture, and household items - making sure every detail respected her dignity and independence. Sitting on her new couch, tears of relief on her face, Jody shared that she hadn't had a stable home since childhood. This wasn't just a move-in, it was a restoration of dignity and belonging.

We don't always know where our clients' journeys will lead, but what a privilege to have days where we get to stand beside them.

ADDICTIONS RECOVERY

Bill's Place - 19 spaces Haven Place - 8 spaces AWARE Program - 38 attendees **32**Program Completions

Our Addictions Recovery program is a safe, therapeutic place where people struggling with addiction can step onto a new pathway toward health and stability. This year, 54 people began the journey with us, and 32 completed the program. Residents are rebuilding their lives, reconnecting with family, and finding purpose through work and community.

To meet growing demand, we're expanding—with plans to add 30 new spaces across primary care, second-stage recovery, and family programs, including a dedicated home for our AWARE Family Program.

Story of Success

Kim (pseudonym) arrived at Bill's Place from years on the street, surrounded by violence, substance use, and loss. In just over a year, she has rebuilt relationships with her children, reconnected with her mother, celebrated one year of sobriety, and completed her Human Service Worker program. Today, she has moved into independent living and works with us as a Peer Support Worker, offering the same hope and guidance that once helped her take her first steps forward.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

Served - 144 clients Wait List - 80 people

Employment Services is a partnership with Community Futures of North Okanagan, which helps individuals facing barriers to employment take meaningful steps toward stable employment and personal growth. The program offers employment readiness workshops, training, skills assessments, job coaching, personal counselling, assistive technology services, unpaid work experience, and essential work clothing and tools.

FOOD SERVICES

Turning Points' Food Services team ensures that residents and participants across our supportive housing sites, transitional housing site, shelters, and outreach teams receive healthy, delicious meals every day. Led by our food services manager, coordinator, and on-site cooks, the program serves

roughly 1,000 meals daily.

Through strong community partnerships – particularly with the Lake Country Food Bank and the Salvation Army - we reclaim about 1,000 pounds of food each week, turning donations like a recent 200-pound batch of peaches into nutritious dishes. We also ensure any leftover meals are diverted to unsheltered people through our outreach teams. This efficient and cost-effective approach allows us to increase meal quality and reach, while staying under budget at every location.

This year, we also supported the **Adopt a Senior Program**, a highly successful pilot project in partnership with Nexus B.C., bringing nourishment, connection, and hope to isolated seniors in our community.

Stony of Success

After losing her husband, Gail's (pseudonym) days felt empty and isolating. Grief stricken and without family support or a driver's license, she couldn't get groceries, attend appointments, or sort out her finances. With her stove broken, even cooking was impossible, and she was quickly heading into poverty.

A delivery from the **Adopt a Senior Program**—meals she could heat in the microwave—was the first step in breaking through her grief. That simple act opened the door to conversations about transportation, home repairs, and other supports. What began as a food delivery became the start of rebuilding Gail's stability, comfort, and hope.

Spotlight on Innovation

HOLISTIC HARM REDUCTION

Traditional harm reduction focuses on minimizing the risks and harmful effects of substance use—such as preventing overdoses, reducing disease transmission, and ensuring people have access to safer use supplies. Holistic Harm Reduction (HHR) builds on this foundation by taking a "whole human" approach, addressing not just physical safety, but also emotional, social, and spiritual well-being. This means creating healthy environments, routines, and support systems that help people thrive beyond immediate survival.

"Our hypothesis was simple: if people are no longer isolated in environments where substance use is a social activity, and instead have access to substance-free spaces and healthy connections, the frequency of use will decrease naturally."

This year we launched the HHR pilot program at Bartley Road Shelter. The results have been remarkable. Clients report improved health, stronger routines, and a renewed sense of dignity. Staff have seen a rise in housing placements, more transitions to other supports, and stronger engagement with treatment programs.

This approach doesn't replace traditional harm reduction—it enhances it by fostering environments where healthier choices can thrive. The overwhelmingly positive feedback from clients makes one thing clear: this model works, and it's ready to be rolled out organization wide.



finances

Turning Points Collaborative Society continued to experience growth in 2024/25 with revenues increasing 14% over the prior fiscal year. This was due to a full year of operation for The Lions, a senior's affordable housing building in West Kelowna, and Trailside, a transitional housing complex in Kelowna. There was also a 37% increase in rent supplements for the region we serve. We also partnered with CMHA, and received a significant increase in funding for our sober living facility and programming.
